# Deputy Grand Knight's Perspective

What does it mean to be a "practical" Catholic in communion with the Holy See? The answer is we, as Knights of Columbus, live by the basic truths of our Faith which are:



**A.** The Apostles' Creed: I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth. And in Jesus Christ, his only son, our Lord; who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell; on the third day he arose again from the dead; he Ascended into heaven, sits at the right hand of God, the Father almighty; from thence he shall come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the Communion of Saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

**B.** The Commandments of God are 10:  
 1. I am the Lord, your God. You shall not have strange gods before Me.  
 2. You shall not take the name of the Lord, your God, in vain.  
 3. Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day.  
 4. Honor your father and your mother.  
 5. You shall not kill.  
 6. You shall not commit adultery.  
 7. You shall not steal.  
 8. You shall not bear false witness

against your neighbor.  
 9. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife.  
 10. You shall not covet your neighbor's goods.

**C.** The Commandments of God may be restated in simpler form: the "Greatest Commandment."

The "Greatest Commandment" is: You shall love the Lord your God with your whole heart, your whole soul, your whole mind and you shall love your neighbor as yourself.

**D.** It is difficult for the unaided human being to live up to the Commandments of God.

To assist us in this regard Jesus has left us the Church and the sacraments. The sacraments are signs instituted by Christ to give grace. There are seven: Baptism, Penance, Holy Eucharist, Confirmation, Matrimony, Holy Orders and the Anointing of the sick. Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Orders can be received only once because these sacraments leave an indelible mark on the soul of the recipient. Penance, Eucharist, Matrimony and the Anointing of the Sick can be received more than once.

**E.** There are two kinds of grace: Sanctifying grace makes us holy and pleasing to God. Actual grace helps us to do good and avoid evil.

**F.** The precepts of the Church are:  
 1. to assist at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation.  
 2. to fast and abstain on the days appointed.  
 3. to confess one's sins at least once a year.  
 4. to receive the Holy Eucharist during the Easter time.  
 5. to contribute to support the Church  
 6. to observe the laws of the Church concerning marriage.  
 7. to join in the missionary spirit and apostolate of the Church.  
 (Note: the first six are traditionally con-

sidered to be the precepts of the Church.)

**G.** There are six "Holy Days of Obligation" in the United States: Christmas; Solemnity of the Mother of God (Jan 1); Ascension of the Lord; Assumption of Mary; All Saints Day; Feast of the Immaculate Conception. They are called "of obligation" because on these days Catholics must attend Mass, just as on Sundays.

**H.** Pentecost is known as the "Birthday of the Church." On that day the Holy Spirit descended on the apostles, giving them the graces they needed to go forth and teach the Gospel to all nations. This is one meaning of the word "Catholic": the Church is found in every land, therefore it is "universal," "worldwide."

**I.** The seven capital sins are: pride, covetousness, lust, anger, gluttony, envy and sloth.

**J.** The gifts of the Holy spirit are: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord.

**K.** The rosary is a form of mental and (See **PRACTICAL** on page 4)

## Notes from the Faithful Navigator

I attended the 4<sup>th</sup> Degree State Exemplification in Charlotte, North Carolina on November 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup>. This was the 4<sup>th</sup> exemplification I had attended either as a candidate, observer, or an officer. It was one of the best organized, well presented and informative exemplification and officers meeting I have attended.



There were 187 candidates of which the Kenneth I. Parker Assembly 1820 had four. We welcome to our Assembly, Richard Dodson, James Fernandez, George Halyak and Proctor Kidwell. SK Kidwell is a member of the Washington, N.C. Council but assigned to our Assembly.

Because of space, I will restrict my article to the keynote speaker, Sir Knight and Sergeant First Class John L. Mims, Retired U.S. Army 1938-1939 and 1941-1963. Mims is a three-time Purple Heart recipient who made the military a career. In 1941 he arrived in the Philippines a carefree soldier and met and married his wife, Juanita, who later was a spy for the USA against the Japanese.

On April 9, 1942, his life changed forever. Mims was captured and survived what historians call one of the greatest inhumanities against Americans during World War II—the Bataan Death March; a 55-65 mile trail that claimed the lives of thousands. An estimated 1,000 of the 10,000 Americans died in the march and of those

that survived thousands died over the next three years of torture, starvation, disease or were executed by the Japanese. During World War II, about 1.1 percent of American POW's held by the Germans died and about 37 percent held by the Japanese died. It is estimated that 67 percent of American defenders of Bataan died.

John Mims, who was barely 20 when he was captured, talked about the three things that kept him alive; his will to live, survival skills learned as a young boy growing up on a Cherokee

Indian reservations, and God who carried him through the march. Today his home is filled with portraits and relics of the Bless Virgin Mary.

Mims told the audience that he has forgiven the Japanese, but he can't forget the past and hopes Americans will remember the stories told by wartime survivors. The inhumanities suffered by our military men in wartime are real and have changed many lives forever.

It was very moving to see and listen to the story of SK John Mims, a wartime survivor. Everyone in the audience could feel the pain and suffering endured by many Americans.

As we celebrate the holiday season, I ask you to be generous to St. Paul Catholic Church and to those families suffering hard times. From our house to yours, Rosemary & I wish all of you a Very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!
