Ride a Good Workhorse 'til He Drops

No amount of words can express my Love for Lud Hartung. I first met Lud in 2001 when I joined him as a Brother Knight of Columbus with Council 3303. He was a learned man and would become a mentor to me. We were all “old school”: a time when men treated each other like men and took no offense to good natured ribbing about our cultural and ethnic differences. The imposing clouds of political correctness had not yet appeared over the horizon, much less the lethal corona virus pandemic which would reveal in a terrifying way our human frailty sweeping across our Nation leaving behind half a million victims in its wake. Lud and I shared stories of our common Bavarian heritage that we agreed no doubt gave birth to our DNA of hard headedness and attention to detail. Lud was a man of prayer and great faith yet very pragmatic. His patience, self-effacing demeanor and quick wit drew you to him as a humble leader. I remember complaining to him about my increasing workload as council membership chairman and other duties as a council officer. He looked me in the eye, rested his hand on my shoulder and reminded me that doing God’s work is never easy; our mission to help the poor and special needs citizens in the community, and St. Paul Church needs the collective best efforts of all of us. He went on to tell me that having been around farming a good part of his life had taught him many valuable lessons. He winked and said, if you have a good workhorse, ride him ‘til he drops.

Everyone here today could share his/her own stories about how being around Lud always lifted your spirits and made you walk away with a smile. During the past several years while Lud and I faced our own deteriorating serious medical issues, laughter remained part of our conversation. When I told him that my recent sixth cancer treatment on my head required removing a piece of my scalp three inches wide and half an inch deep, Lud quipped, face it, they can swap kidneys in and out but they can’t replace your head. He told me that when he was informed of his incurable bone marrow cancer diagnosis, it was too bad that along the way they hadn’t discovered gold growing in his veins –that would make Bev a rich woman after he was gone.

God gave you the strength, Lud, to carry your Cross of suffering in union with the crucified Savior Jesus. But now your pain is no more, and your days on earth as a good and faithful workhorse have come to an end.

Rest in peace, my friend.

Lenten Fish Frys Feed Over 400 Meals

The Knights of Columbus Lenten Fish Frys were once again a huge success. Our Fish Fry Team, led by SK Ralph Aviles, cooked and distributed over 400 fish dinners on three separate Friday nights in late February and March. This year all meals were served at the Family Life Center in a Drive-Thru manner. Many parishioners who attended the Stations of the Cross were able to pick up their meals after the service. The pictures below show our super cooks and some of the young gentlemen with their fathers representing the Troops of St. George, who moved the meals from the kitchen to the pick-up point.





The "Wall That Heals" is a replica of the Vietnam Memorial Wall located on the Capitol Mall in Washington, D.C. The Wall is coming to New Bern in April of 2021. It is a 3/4 scale replica 375 feet long and 7 1/2 feet tall at its highest point. It is transported in a 53-foot trailer which transforms into a Mobile Education center after the Wall is assembled. The truck will arrive, via motorcycle escort, on the afternoon of Tuesday, April 6th at Lawson Creek Park. The Wall consists of 140 individual panels and is supported by an aluminum frame with LED lighting. It will be set up on Wednesday, April 7th and will be open to visitors April 7-11.

The Wall and Mobile Education Center will be available for viewing 24 hours a day. There will be programs and ceremonies every day. We are in need of volunteers to act as hosts, parking attendants, members of the set-up crew, and miscellaneous chores. Shifts will begin Wednesday afternoon and continue until approximately noon on Sunday. They will be approximately 4 hours in length. The set-up requires 30 able-bodied individuals and takes about 6-7 hours. Plans haven't been finalized yet, but we think we will need 5 hosts during the day and 3 at night per shift. As you can see, this is going to require a lot of manpower. If you can help us out, please contact one of the individuals listed below and provide your name, telephone number, and email address. A child then entered the room – saw the four candles and wondered why only one was lit as they were all meant to be aflame until the end of time. **The Monsignor Jones Council 3303 Sponsors "Reconstruction and the Tar Heel Mission of Father Thomas Price" 1871 -1821, the Third Bicentennial Event with St. Paul Parish
"Dynamic Saint Paul: Celebrating Our Bicentennial" 1821-2021**

The Monsignor Jones Council sponsored the third Bicentennial Event 1871-1921, "Reconstruction and the Tar Heel Mission of Father Thomas Price" at St. Paul Parish assisting staff Kathy Bascom and DeLesa Conway on Sunday, March 28th. The Program consisted of the following: A welcome from the Knights of Columbus by the MC, Bo Wernersbach, Evening Prayer by Deacon Dan Doban, Music provided by the St. Paul Contemporary Choir, and a video Introduc-

tion by Father Thomas Tully. Additional videos highlighted the “Houses” at St. Paul Catholic School, “The Story of Father Price”, and “The Catholic Presence of Women Religious” in New Bern to include The Sisters of Mercy during The Civil War, the Sisters of St. Joseph and the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The period covered also coincided with the founding of the Knights of Columbus Order in 1882, by Blessed Michael McGivney.

Since this period also included the founding of Pepsi-Cola in 1892 in New Bern the Council decided to serve Pepsi to attendees.
