Brother Knights,

The month of October has found the Knights involved in many projects. Both the Council and Assembly have been busy. The Assembly held a Yard Sale at the beginning of the month and the Council restarted Bingo on October 12th. The revenue from both of these activities supports so many programs. Our council is thankful to the Assembly for providing their funds to support most of our ex-

penses through December since Bingo was shut down for several months. The Columbus Club also helped tremendously by forgiving our rent payment for the last quarter of this calendar year. We have a great team of Knights. A brief summary of our activities follows:

• **Coats for Kids:** We distributed six dozen winter coats to many students in St. Paul Catholic School and children from our Spanish Community. We could not have done this without the help of Anne Munz at the school and Judith Denison who organized the support to the Spanish Community.

• **Battle Buddy Project:** This on-going project involves an attempt to call every member of our council to verify their contact information and to just check in. Special thanks to several council members for taking on this effort. If you have not been contacted via phone or email that probably means your contact information is out of date. • **Shrimp Boil:** The 16th Annual Jim Whetzel Memorial Shrimp Boil, held on October 16th, was a great success. Phil Nasseff and Craig Baader were the leaders for this super fraternal event and fund raiser. See the article later in this issue for all the details.

- **LAMB:** Tootsie rolls were handed out by several ushers after the masses on October 10th and 11th. Donations were tremendous so we have a good start to gathering funds to support the special needs teachers in several local schools. Thanks to Jim Kelly for organizing the collections. We hope to be allowed to have a collection in the Spring at Wal-Mart. COVID-19 rules will dictate.

- **Membership:** Membership is increasing. Our Membership Director, Dan Macsary provides the details in a separate article in this issue.
- **Christmas Cards Sales:** Our new approach to offering cards that support Keeping Christ in Christmas has worked very well. Due to COVID-19 we decided to offer the option of ordering the cards via mail. The card order has been submitted and the cards will be available for pickup after masses in late November.
- **Life Chain:** Our Life Director, Jerry Schill, led a group of 50 volunteers participating in the 2020 New Bern Life Chain, an annual silent protest against abortion. More details and a picture appear later in this issue.

Looking Ahead: Our council will continue to be busy in the next few months.

- **Mass and Memorial Ceremony:** Knights, spouses and widows have been invited to attend the 11 AM Mass on November 1st and to gather at the altar after the Mass to honor our deceased brothers with special recognition for those who have passed in the last year. Following the ceremony, we will have a reception in the Family Life Center. Gordy Barnes is our lead. DeLesa Conway has arranged for refreshments at the reception. Special thanks to James Knickerbocker for preparing the Memorial Ceremony Program.
- **Thanksgiving Baskets:** Our council supports twelve families with food for a complete Thanksgiving dinner plus additional food for several other meals. Our involvement is under the umbrella of the Fund For Needy Children, a project founded by families in the Greenbriar Community many years ago. Our support has evolved from just supporting the lead person, Dena Sierocki (who has moved from New Bern) to an expanded role. This year many Knights have donated food. Rosemary Whetzel and several other ladies will purchase the remainder of the food. The Piggly Wiggly grocery store prepares twelve boxes with all needed perishable items to include a turkey. Dave Nelson is our lead.
- **Christmas Celebration at St. Paul School:** On December 1st Santa and Mrs. Claus (Brother Jerry Schill and his wife Pam) will visit each classroom in the school to wish the children a Merry Christmas and give each teacher a gift for the Classroom. Gordy Barnes and Rosemary Whetzel are our leads.
- **Spiritual Day of Reflection:** Brother Dick Dodson is leading the planning for a Spiritual Day of Reflection on a Saturday in January. He is in discussions with our Chaplain, Father Tully and the State Chaplain, Father Lesak to organize this activity.

Two of Our Honorary Life Members Have Passed: SK Joseph (Jay) E. Mattingly Jr. passed on September 24, 2020. He is survived by his beloved wife of 27 years Sandra Mattingly. He was a proud Marine and member of American Legion Post 24 for over 70 years. Our beloved Danny Gennantonio recruited Dave into the Knights and he has contributed ever sense. He works BINGO, the Thanksgiving food distribution program and has recently become Chancellor and Community Director with responsibility for managing charitable contributions for our council. In addition, he ushers at the 5pm Saturday Mass and delivers communion to hospital patients. He and Kathy too deliver communion to shut-ins on Sundays. Deacon Jim and his wife Lisa recently relocated from San Diego, California to New Bern in 2017. They are the proud parents of Tim, Travis and Shamus and grandparents to Tyler James and Keira. Activities such as cooking, dining, wine tasting and involvement in local events where they can enjoy the company of their family and friends are important to them. 


Faithful Navigator Report



The fall season is upon us and another yard sale is in the books. Our sale this past Oct 1-3 was our second best ever! Including our presales and mini-sale in September, we were able to raise just over \$50,00, which will allow us to provide funding to the 30+ charities that we normally support. A huge thank you goes out to Pat Rocco, Craig Baader, the “truck monkeys,” and all the folks who staff the various departments that make up our sale. It is truly a Herculean effort to collect, sort, and price all the donations that come to us. Congratulations to all for a job well done!

As you may know, the Council’s bingo operation has once again resumed after being shut down by the State due to Covid19 concerns. The loss of 6 months of revenue has put a serious strain on the Council’s financial situation. Our Assembly voted at our last meeting to advance \$25,000 which will allow it to fund its various charitable donations and pay its other expenses through the end of the year. The annual Jim Whetzel Memorial Shrimp Boil took place on Oct 16 and it was a huge success. They served over 200 meals which provided some much-needed revenue. Hopefully, bingo will make a quick recovery and things can return to normal in the near future.



On another subject, Father Michael McGivney, the founder of the Knights of Columbus, will be beatified during a special Mass Oct. 31 at the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Hartford, CT. On May 27, the Vatican announced that Pope Francis, who met with the board of directors of the Knights of Columbus in February, had signed the decree recognizing a miracle through the intercession of Father McGivney, clearing the way for his beatification. The miracle recognized by the Vatican occurred in 2015 and involved a U.S. baby, still in utero, with a life-threatening condition that, under most circumstances, could have led to an abortion. That baby, Mikey Schachle, is now 5. His parents, Dan and Michelle Schachle, of Dickson, Tennessee, prayed to Father McGivney to intercede with God to save their son, still in his mother’s womb, who was given no hope of surviving a life-threatening case of fetal hydrops. Once beatified, Fr. McGivney will be conferred with the title of “Blessed”. One more miracle must be attributed to him before he can be canonized. The

beatification ceremony will be broadcasted on EWTN and Catholic TV. It will also be live-streamed on www.kofc.org/beatification.

That’s it for now -- stay safe, wear your mask and follow the published guidelines for mitigating the effects of Covid19. Your health is of the utmost importance to me. God bless you all.

The Giving Trees

The Fall issue of *Our State Magazine* showcases the colorful autumn foliage found in North Carolina and celebrates the fruits of harvesting home-grown products. An article titled *The Giving Trees* describes a time-honored traditional craft: the cyclical process to transform sap into sweet Appalachian maple syrup. It is sure to be one of the yummy condiments on your breakfast table smothering a stack of pancakes or waffles, especially during the holiday season. On the southern Blue Ridge Parkway with its bountiful clear cascading waterfalls, around Feb.1 when the dormancy period ends and the stored-up sugars start flowing again, it is time to begin drawing sap. The author points out that the process of making maple syrup evokes a particular spiritual rhythm: commitment, diligent patience: and timing/knowing when to uproot trees and plant new saplings, when to start drawing next year's sap and begin the cycle all over again.

The flavor of batches varies year to year, week to week, and day to day; no two batches are alike because outside nature is always processing. Earlier batches contain light floral tones, later progressing to more molasses-like, complex and darker in color. While northern maple syrup has the traditional maple flavor, southern Appalachian maple syrup is more butterscotch, like brown sugar and vanilla. The sugarhouse is the hub of the process. Inside is a large machine called an evaporator which boils the sap down to syrup. One person is responsible for the wood supply, carrying chopped firewood from outside into the sugar house. Another worker sits by the fire and tosses the wood (seven cords a day) into the red hot boiler, another individual adds water as needed to the boiler and opens the valve in the back of the oven, draws out the syrup and pours it into a holding vat which is carefully marked, identifying the date and session number. It takes 60 gallons of sap to produce one gallon of syrup.

The social norms in our world today praise going it alone as heroic, laugh at commitment and equate patience with weakness. After reading this article, I couldn't help but draw a parallel to its content and how Sacred Scripture describes our spiritual life as true Catholic Christians. While we share the common goal of one day reaching the eternal Kingdom, we are not alone. During our earthly pilgrimage each of us has gifts that we can use to allow God's goodness shine through us to help one another along the way. The unpretentious sugar house, typically a humble abode, could be any place where two or more people gather in His name. A few familiar Sacred Scripture verses come to mind. Ecclesiastes 3:1-11: "There are appointed times for everything ... a time to be born and a time to die ...a time to laugh and a time to cry ... a time to plant and a time to uproot ... a time to speak and a time to be silent ... a time to hug and a time to let go." Psalms 144:1-4: "Blessed be the Lord my rock, who trains my hands for battle, my fingers for war." Corinthians 12:4: "There are different kinds of services for the Lord, different spiritual gifts but the same Spirit."

Brother Knights and friends, we should pray continually to God our Father and Creator for the strength to persevere in doing His Will.

Pray for Souls in Purgatory on All Souls Day - November 2

The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, or All Souls Day, is the feast day dedicated to praying for all those who have died and are in purgatory. Souls in purgatory "have not yet been purified" in order to enter heaven. That said, the Church teaches those in purgatory will get to heaven eventually and our prayers help them get there.

"All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1030) Our prayers can help them "atone for their sins and enter into heaven." That is why Catholic parishes celebrate All Souls Day masses, hold special prayer services and adoration times, bless graves, have rosary processions at cemeteries and place the photos of deceased loved ones near the altar in church. To find out how All Souls Day is celebrated in your area, contact a parish near you.

All Souls Day should not be confused with All Saints Day, which is celebrated on Nov. 1. All Saints Day celebrates the saints who have already entered heaven and we ask them to pray for us so we can follow their example. It is a holy day of obligation to attend Mass.

In his 2015 All Souls Day homily, Bishop Anthony B. Taylor of Little Rock, Arkansas, explains who might go to purgatory and why. "Here we are, finite and limited, full of defects and venial sins and distortions of character, some the lasting damage of sins already forgiven but with interior effects not yet fully healed. We are on the right track but far from perfect while heaven is everything that we are not: perfect, infinite and unlimited."

"Purgatory is the process by which God remedies all that is lacking in us and that's where our prayers can help the dead. Just as in this life, so also in purgatory, growth and healing is much easier when you've got help, in this case the help of our prayers," he added. "And once they get into heaven, they'll surely reciprocate by interceding for us. That's what the communion of saints is all about — helping each other on the road to salvation."

How will your final expenses be paid?

In 1882, our Founder, as of October 31st of this year, Blessed Father Michael J McGivney, started our Order to provide financial assistance to Catholic families. In the early days of the Order, membership was your “life insurance premium”. Until the Order took hold, in order to pay a death benefit to the family, it was not uncommon to “pass the hat” to obtain funds for the family of the deceased Brother to pay his final expenses and provide funds for the family to carry on.

In 2020, the mission of the Order has not changed with one exception, there is no reason a family, or a Council should have to pass the hat, or in modern terms, use crowd sourcing such as Go Fund Me to cover final expenses and hopefully have money left over to support the remaining spouse or other family members.

Yes, this has happened recently within the Councils I serve. Brothers, hearing this from Council Officers, and directly from a family is heart breaking and upsetting. With very few exceptions, the Order can provide at least minimal coverage to take the burden off your loved ones, but you have to take that first step. I can provide you with a financial analysis and needs analysis, make recommendations on how we can meet any needs for your final expenses, or ensure your spouse, or children receive tax free funds.

Let’s get to together, Brother Knight to Brother Knight.
