Hey, Old Man, How Is It Going?

"Hey, old man, how is it going?" Whenever we met, Bart, that's the way you always greeted me. Often your dry sense of humor would kick in with a follow up quip like "beats the alternative" or "we're only as old as we look."

Shortly after my wife Rita and I relocated to New Bern from MD, I transferred my K of C membership to Council 3303. It was the spring of 2001 at a social gathering hosted by the Knights in our St. Paul grade school gym when we first met Bart and Mary Spano who asked if they could join us at our table. It didn't take long to realize that the Spanos were a learned and faith filled couple. Straightening your tie (I rarely saw you without a tie and jacket), I recall Mary asking you if you had given much thought about what you would do as the newly elected Grand Knight which was coming up in a couple of weeks. Your response evoked a bit of snickering from the folks around us but in reality it gave us a peek at the breadth and depth and height of your humble trust in God when you replied, 'Not really ... God will show me the plan when it's time.'

I soon learned this sometimes disheveled man resembling the absent minded professor, lived life with a joyful gusto at any pace - until increasing serious health issues necessitated the one by one removal your "toys": be it 3,000 up in the air piloting a friend in your plane to see New Bern as God views it, or zipping along the highway bridge crossing the Trent River on your latest motor cycle (flipping more than a few), or creeping around town in your bright yellow (and increasingly dented) vintage VW Bug.

But one thing you stood firm and rock solid on was the relentless defense of the unborn child. You and Brother Knights Hugh McHugh, the late Jim Bottcher and others calling yourselves the "band of brothers" exemplified our beloved Parish Patron, St. Paul and his companions. You put your faith into action: traveling to distant places, writing letters and lobbying county, state and U.S. Legislators to enact laws prohibiting abortions. Typically, on a Sunday afternoon regardless of weather conditions, you stood shoulder-to-shoulder distributing pro life literature to everyone entering the (no longer standing) Onslow County Pregnancy Aid Center where (at the time) abortions were routinely committed. It was here that the 'band of brothers' was arrested for blocking the entrance to government property. But charges were dropped as a first time misdemeanor offense. This didn't stop your mission. Your numbers grew as wives, children and members of other Christian denominations joined you along the right-of-way across the road where they waved pro life signs, sang spiritual hymns, and prayed the rosary. Through your courageous and selfless actions Council 3303 with support from the K of C North Carolina State Council began raising funds to finance the very expensive purchase of an Ultra-Sound Machine which clearly shows life begins at the moment of conception in the mother's womb. Upon its arrival this 'miracle' machine was donated for use by the pro life Eastern Pregnancy Information Centers in New Bern and Kinston. Today these machines are available in hospitals across America as a resource for any woman finding herself in the agonizing situation of an unwanted pregnancy.

You labeled your earthly suffering and sicknesses "a few bumps in the road. But you pushed on, Bart, doing God's Will; now you have overcome pain and death forever. To me, your legacy was proclaimed 2,000 years ago; by our beloved St. Paul, 'I have finished the race... I have done well, I have kept the faith.'

One day I hope to once again hear that familiar greeting, "Hey, old man, how is it going?" Until then - rest in peace, my friend.

Brothers, Blessed Michael McGivney saw this as a problem in the 1880's. He saw the plight of Catholic families when the bread winner was taken too early. He witnessed Probate Courts foster out the children if the widow could not show the financial resources to continue to raise her children. Many times, this resulted not only in the family being split up, but the children being taken away from their faith.

The only thing worse than your family discovering you did not have any insurance, at the least, to take care of final expenses, is the widow discovering that the insurance her late husband told her about expired, lapsed, or ended when he retired. The same question is uttered each time, "what am I going to do?"

Brothers, the Order provides you a vehicle to ensure those you leave behind don't have to ask that question. I am available to sit down with you to conduct a review. With the tools the Order has given me, together we can confirm if you are "all set" or if there is a need. If there is a need, I can provide you with solutions to meet the need, it's up to you to act on the solution.

Let's work together to ensure your family doesn't have to rely on the village.

Congratulations to the Monsignor James R. Jones, Council 3303 September Knight of the Month Brother Carlos Espinoza.

Carlos was born in Guatemala City, Guatemala, Central America in 1953 and in 1961 he immigrated with his parents to San Francisco, CA. As a new child immigrant to the U.S., Carlos learned to speak English by watching cartoons. He attended Catholic schools (elementary and high school), graduating from Riordan High School, San Francisco in 1971. In 1976, he finished his Engineering Studies and graduated as a Civil Engineer from San Francisco State University. After college Carlos was hired by the City of San Francisco as a Resident Engineer. In 1985 he was hired by Alameda County (the second largest county) in California. Alameda County offered him the opportunity to expand into buildings, with a specialty in Hospital Construction, (OSHPD Inspector). In 1997, he joined Redwood City where he worked for 16 years, until he and Marta retired in 2013.

Carlos was married to Marta in 1976. She was born in San Salvador, El Salvador. Marta worked for UC Medical Center in San Francisco as a Laboratory Assistant and Stanford University as a Program Manager. They are blessed with four daughters (Jennifer, Yamileth, Maria-Cristina and Karina) and ten grandchildren. Three of their daughters live in the Raleigh area and one still lives with her family in California. In 2004, Marta and Carlos became Naturalized Citizens.

Carlos' interest in the Knights of Columbus occurred at one of the Our Lady's feast day celebrations at Basilica of Mission Dolores in San Francisco where the Honor Guard led the police escorted procession into the church. Both Carlos and Marta were initiated in the Our Lady of Guadalupe Society, where Marta's parents were co-founders at Mission Dolores Church in 2000 and Carlos served as President and Marta as the Event Coordinator. They helped establish the largest celebration mass in honor of Our Lady of Guadalupe on her feast day on December 12.

The Espinoza's settled in New Bern in 2017 via Frederick, Maryland and Charles Town, West Virginia after they relocated from California. In 2018 their home flooded during Hurricane Florence. Carlos said that the Saint Paul Church community was their heavenly angels by providing food and supplies, and more importantly their prayers.

Marta is a Eucharistic Minister and sits on two boards - the Saint Paul School Board and the Saint Paul Parochial Council. Carlos is a Reader at St. Paul Church for the 11:00 AM Mass, in addition to serving as our Council's Outside Guard.

Carlos's hobbies include traveling, which has taught him many things, especially about other cultures, gardening – he grows their own fruits and vegetables, fishing, reading, and spending time with his family.

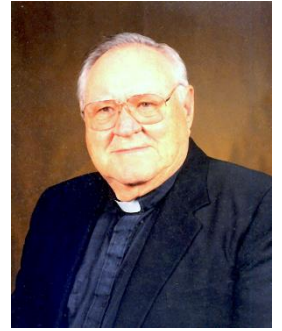
