January 25 is the Feast Day of the Conversion of St. Paul, Our Parish's Patron Saint

St. Paul, named Saul at birth, was born at Tarsus, Cilicia, of Jewish parents who were descended from the tribe of Benjamin. He was a Roman citizen from birth. As he was "a young man" at the stoning of Stephen and "an old man" when writing to Philemon, about the year 63, he was probably born around the beginning of the Christian era.

To complete his schooling, Saul was sent to Jerusalem, where he sat at the feet of the learned Gamaliel and was educated in the strict observance of the ancestral Law. Here he also acquired a good knowledge of exegesis and was trained in the practice of disputation. As a convinced and zealous Pharisee, he returned to Tarsus before the public life of Christ opened in Palestine.

After the death of Our Lord, Saul returned to Palestine. His profound conviction made his zeal develop to a religious fanaticism against the infant Church. He took part in the stoning of the first martyr, St. Stephen, and in the fierce persecution of the Christians that followed.

Entrusted with a formal mission from the high priest, he departed for Damascus to arrest the Christians there and bring them bound to Jerusalem. As he was nearing Damascus, about noon, a light from heaven suddenly blazed round him. Jesus with His glorified body appeared to him and addressed him, turning him away from his apparently successful career.

An immediate transformation was wrought in the soul of Saul. He was suddenly converted to the Christian Faith. He was baptized, changed his name from Saul to Paul, and began travelling and preaching the Faith. He was martyred as an Apostle in Rome around 65 AD.

St. Paul is the **Patron** of the people and of authors, the Cursillo movement, evangelists, journalists, lay people, musicians, public relations work, publishers, reporters, saddle-makers, tentmakers, and writers; he is against snakes. **Symbols** of St. Paul include book and sword, three fountains, two swords, scourge, serpent and a fire, armor of God, twelve scrolls with names of his Epistles, phoenix, palm tree, shield of faith, and sword; book. He is often portrayed as a thin-faced elderly man with a high forehead, receding hairline and long pointed beard; man holding a sword and a book; man with 3 springs of water nearby.

Do You Have the Right Type of Life Insurance?

Happy New Year! I hope you all had a Merry Christmas.

When speaking to Brother Knights, they usually tell me they have "enough life insurance". My response to them is, "Do you have the right type of life insurance?" Of course, this always brings on strange looks.

Having the right amount of life insurance is sometimes not as important as the having the right type of life insurance. Members who have term insurance may not realize that most term

insurance ends at age 70. Many of you will live beyond age 70. In fact, less than 1 out of 100 term policies will ever actually pay a death claim. Now at age 70, you realize that you need whole life insurance that has a guaranteed death benefit until age 120. Plus, the death benefit is paid income-tax free to your beneficiaries.

About 50% of working persons participate in a group life insurance program through their employer. This "security blanket" is not guaranteed to be there when it is needed the most. The benefit amount is not based on the needs of the insured or their family, but an amount that is mostly tied to a salary multiple. Companies may reduce or cancel this benefit in bad economic times, they may not be transportable, and they do not provide cash value the insured can access in emergencies.

Younger members should be looking for whole life insurance for the same reason. You can learn from your experienced Brother Knights and buy whole life insurance now to "lock in" at a much lower rate. Our whole life insurance pays dividends that increase the death benefit and have a cash value that increases as well (if you continue to pay your premiums). The cash value can be accessed for such needs as emergencies, funding education, or to supplement your retirement income.

You may be one of the members who bought universal life or variable life, which is sometimes sold as "whole life insurance and an investment". However, the actual cost of insurance is increasing while your premiums remain the same. As the cost grows larger than the premium, they deduct the difference from your cash value until the money runs out and the policy lapses.

To protect my brother knights, I ask that ALL OF YOU request a 20-year projection of future values from your other insurance companies. Call me when you get it. Together, we will review the information to decide what options are best for you. Don't just assume you have a whole life policy or that all insurances are the same.

Well, the events of the past year have certainly presented challenges organization. We saw the emergence of the Covid19 virus which soon touched every facet of American life. Businesses have closed, schools have closed, jobs were lost, and hospitals and food banks have been stretched to their limits. The virus has killed over 5,900 in our state, over 300,000 in our country and over 1.6 million world-wide. Restrictions imposed by the authorities have affected our Council and Assembly in a number of ways. The Council's bingo operation was totally shut down until just recently. The Columbus Club has been unable to rent the Hall. Most of our meetings have either been cancelled or held virtually. The only bright spot, if there is one, is that our Yard Sale has continued to go strong. Our volunteers have continued to work tirelessly to collect, sort, and price the myriad donations that continue to flood into our operation daily. Sales this year have generated over \$77,000 which enabled us to continue to support our church, school, and over 30 local and

national charities at pre-covid levels. With the arrival of the new vaccines, there seems to be some light at the end of the tunnel. We will, however, have to get through the coming winter. The number of hospitalizations and deaths due to the virus have continued to increase in recent weeks, so we cannot let our guard down. We must continue to take the recommended steps to mitigate the effects of the virus. Wear your mask, keep your distance, and wash your hands. Get vaccinated as soon as it becomes available and hopefully in the next few months we can get back to normal.

On another subject, the Vietnam traveling wall we be coming to New Bern this coming April. As you may remember, it was supposed to have come last April, but the whole tour was cancelled due to Covid19. The tour is back on in 2021 and New Bern will be the first stop. The Wall will be on display for four days and we will need volunteers to act as docents, parking attendants, volunteer coordinators and to cover other odd jobs. Ralph Aviles, Randall Ramian, and I are in charge of lining up volunteers. Please consider helping us out. We will be sending out information on how to volunteer in the next couple of months.

Finally, on behalf of myself and the officers of our Assembly, I want to wish every one of you a very merry Christmas and happy New Year. Stay safe and here's to looking forward to a happy, healthy, and "normal" 2021.
