## 8 (Spiritual) New Year's Resolutions for Catholics

January is here again, and it's time to make our annual New Year's resolutions. Lose weight? Quit smoking? Exercise more? Good for your body – but what about your SOUL? Every Catholic should add to their list a few spiritual resolutions designed to help them climb that mountain of faith! Let the freshness of a new year be your impetus to make new strides in your walk with God. There is no time like the present!

Here are some ideas.

### 1. Increase Your Devotion to Mary

Our Lady of Fatima made urgent pleas for mankind to reform themselves and to pray her rosary daily. However, Our Lady's pleas have not been heeded, and the last century has seen a widespread loss of Christian faith, massive breakdowns in marriages and families, and the rejection of basic moral laws.

In the new year, commit yourself to increasing your Marian devotion so that she may lead you to deeper conversion; to a renewed following of God's will for your life; and to an increase of your faith and trust in Jesus Christ.

### 2. Make more time for spiritual reading

The brilliant St. Athanasius once said, "You will not see anyone who is striving after his advancement who is not given to spiritual reading. If you want to make progress in your walk with God in the new year, spiritual reading should be high on your list.

Your best bet is to stick to the classics written by Catholic saints known for their practical spiritual wisdom—such as Teresa of Avila, Francis de Sales, Therese of Lisieux, and John of the Cross. The time you spend feeding your soul is time better spent.

### 3. Make good stewardship a lifestyle

This boils down to one key concept in the life of the Christian: practicing good stewardship over the gifts God has given us. Good stewardship means good management of our "time, talent, and treasure" for the greater glory of God. As Jesus warned us in His parables, all of His servants will be judged on how they used the graces he gave them.

### 4. Share your Catholic faith with others

With so many people far away from God today (and more and more people noticing it), the culture is ripe for evangelism. There is a real hunger for God and his Truth.

Another good idea is to buy some sacramentals in bulk, get them blessed, and hand them out to people.

### 5. Bring back regular "penances"

Living a penitential life, even outside of Advent and Lent, is the Catholic way of life. All of the Church's saints performed penances habitually, either internally or externally, great and small, for themselves and for others.

Many Catholics do not know that Fridays outside of Lent are also days of abstinence and fasting. While the Church law against eating meat on the Fridays outside of Lent was altered by the U.S. bishops—meaning, it can be substituted with some other form of penance—it was never removed entirely. Such penances give special reverence to the day of the week on which Our Lord died on the cross.

### 6. Go an extra day to Mass

Mass is not only the source and summit of our faith—it is also the source and summit of our very life. This new year, think of ways you can arrange your schedule and activities so that you can make it to Mass either an extra day each week, or a few extra days a month. The 8 AM Friday Mass at Old St. Paul would be the perfect addition to your weekly "routine".

### 7. Pray the rosary

No Catholic list of New Year's resolutions would be complete without a daily rosary added in. If you already pray the rosary daily, that is fantastic. Your resolution can then be to spread devotion to the rosary this year.

If your parish doesn't have a regular time set aside for the faithful to come together to pray the rosary, for example before

or after Mass on any given day, start it up this year.

### **8. Pick a new saint buddy**

Why not take on the tradition of choosing a different Catholic saint as a special patron each year? There are so many of them with unique graces to bestow.

Pray about your New Year and the goals you have for your spiritual life, your family, your relationships, your career, etc. Then choose a patron saint whose virtues you would like to emulate in New Year, and entrust your year to their special intercession. Perhaps there is a particular saint whom you already admire, but to whom you have never prayed or had a devotion. Ask this saint to be your guide for 2022.

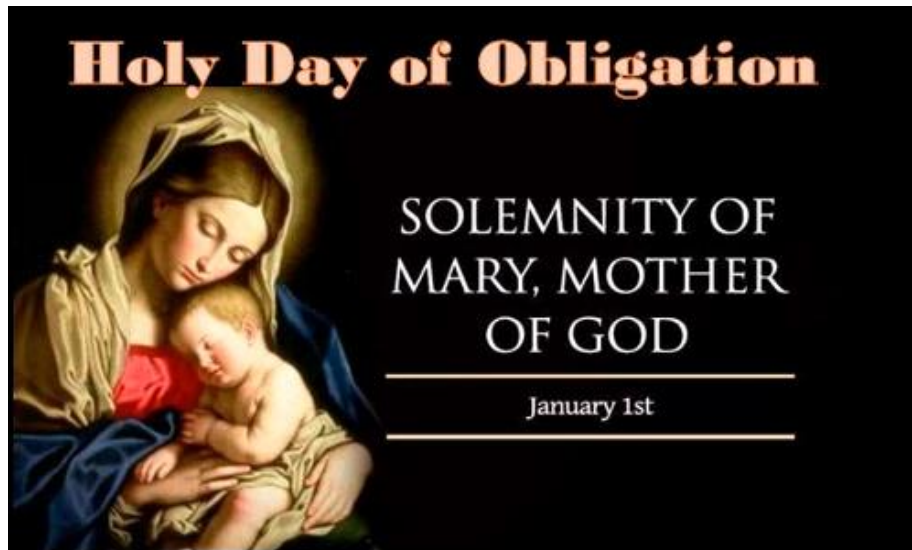
## New Bern Senior Center Christmas Party 2021

We celebrate the liturgical feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary on January 1st, which is the Octave of Christmas. Only Christmas and Easter enjoy the privilege of an octave, which is an eight-day extension of the feast. The honoring of Mary as the Mother of God can be traced back to the Council of Ephesus in 431. By the 7th century, January 1st was observed as a celebration of the Maternity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. In the 13th century, the Feast of the Circumcision of Christ had come to replace the feast honoring Mary; however in 1751, after a push in Portugal for an official feast day celebrating Mary's divine maternity, Pope Benedict XIV allowed Portugal's churches to devote a feast to Mary on the first Sunday in May. Eventually, the feast extended to other countries, and in 1914 began to be observed on October 11. In 1931, Pope Pius XI extended the feast to the entire church, and in 1974, Pope Paul VI removed the feast of the Circumcision of Christ from the liturgical calendar and replaced it with the feast of the "Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God", bringing Mary's feast day back to the first day of the year.

The feast is a celebration of Mary's motherhood of Jesus. The title "Mother of God" is a western derivation from the Greek Theotokos, which means "God-bearer". On this day, we are reminded of the role that the Blessed Virgin played in the plan of our salvation. Through the Holy Spirit, God the Father prepared Mary to be the dwelling place where His Son and His Spirit could dwell among men.

Christ's birth was made possible by Mary's fiat, or sanctioning of God's plan with her words, "Be it done to me according to thy word". Calling Mary "Mother of God" is the highest honor we can give to her. Just as Christmas honors Jesus as the "Prince of Peace", the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God honors Mary as the "Queen of Peace".

New Year's Day is also designated as the "World Day of Peace", further acknowledging the role of Mary in our hearts and in our world.

As the year comes to a close and the holidays are upon us, I can't help but reflect on the awesome job everyone has done over the past year. Despite all the obstacles thrown at us courtesy of the Covid 19 pandemic, you have all shown exceptional passion, dedication, and enthusiasm. Our yard sale crew headed by Pat Rocco and Craig Baader worked tirelessly throughout the year collecting, sorting, culling, and pricing donated items. We staged 3 large sales and one mini sale during 2021 generating over \$120,000. These funds allowed us to support 30+ local and national charities as well as providing support to St. Paul Catholic Church and St. Paul School. We recently wrote checks for Christmas donations to various charities that support the folks who are serving or have served in the US Military including the USO, DAV, Wounded Warriors, Tunnels to Towers, MOA scholarship program, the Kinston Veterans Home and RCS - Veterans. If it wasn't for the tireless efforts of the part time volunteers working every week, we couldn't come close to doing all the good we do.

In April, our Assembly in conjunction with the American Legion led the effort to bring "The Wall That Heals" to New Bern. This ¾ size replica of the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC travels from coast to coast and only a select few cities are chosen to host the "Wall" each year. SK George Halyak chaired the effort to bring the wall to our community and single handedly raised over \$50,000 to make the event possible. Over 20 of our Sir Knights were involved in every facet of the operation from set-up until tear-down. Over 9,000 people came out to visit the wall during its 4-day stay.

These are but two of the many events put on by our Assembly and Council this year. Our members have been instrumental in planning and staging our Installation of Officers, Shrimp Boils, Wives Appreciation Dinner, Widows luncheon, Communion Breakfast, etc, etc. The members of our organization never fail to step up and do whatever it takes to accomplish the task at hand. My hat is off to all of you.

Before I wrap this up, I would like to take time to remember the Sir Knights who passed away this year: Gerry Tetreault, Bart Spano, Chick Natella, Claude Cote, Lud Hartung and John Pina. They were all fine gentlemen and long-time active members of our Assembly. We will miss them dearly. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed rest in peace.

## January 25 is the Feast Day of the Conversion of St. Paul, Our Parish's Patron Saint

**St. Paul**, names Saul at birth, was born at Tarsus, Cilicia, of Jewish parents who were descended from the tribe of Benjamin. He was a

Roman citizen from birth. As he was "a young man" at the stoning of Stephen and "an old man" when writing to Philemon, about the year 63, he was probably born around the beginning of the Christian era.

To complete his schooling, Saul was sent to Jerusalem, where he sat at the feet of the learned Gamaliel and was educated in the strict observance of the ancestral Law. Here he also acquired a good knowledge of exegesis and was trained in the practice of disputation. As a convinced and zealous Pharisee, he returned to Tarsus before the public life of Christ opened in Palestine.

Sometime after the death of Our Lord, Saul returned to Palestine. His profound conviction made his zeal develop to a religious fanaticism against the infant Church. He took part in the stoning of the first martyr, St. Stephen, and in the fierce persecution of the Christians that followed.

Entrusted with a formal mission from the high priest, he departed for Damascus to arrest the Christians there and bring them bound to Jerusalem. As he was nearing Damascus, about noon, a light from heaven suddenly blazed round him. Jesus with His glorified body appeared to him and addressed him, turning him away from his apparently successful career.

An immediate transformation was wrought in the soul of Saul. He was suddenly converted to the Christian Faith. He was baptized, changed his name from Saul to Paul, and began travelling and preaching the Faith. He was martyred as an Apostle in Rome around 65 AD.
