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## Columbus Club

In case you haven't been to the hall lately, there are a number of projects underway. Here's a summary!

**Deck Replacement Project** – The degradation of the base structure on the wooden deck outside of the kitchen necessitated the replacement of the 12' x 12' deck that is used for outdoor cooking at the Shrimp Boils and Cookouts at the hall. The funding for the project was approved by the Assembly in February and the funds were transferred to the Columbus Club later in the month. After reviewing the information provided by several local vendors, we decided to proceed with Edwin Moreno who could complete the fabrication, including concrete work, carpentry, and metal roofing. As it turns out, he also provided the best price for the job. As you can see in the last photo, the scope of the project added a new roof structure that



will protect our outdoor Chef's in the future. We installed a drain field between the deck and the parking lot and eliminated the large above ground propane gas tank. In the near future, we will be wiring the deck to provide outlets, a paddle fan, and lighting. Sooooo, we will soon have some "Pampered Chef's".



**Interior Building Lighting** – We have all known for some time that the lighting in our buildings would require updating. This became increasingly apparent over the past year as the lights have failed and the required ballasts have become increasingly harder to find and more expensive. After receiving bids on the project which replaced the lighting inside of both buildings, our regular electrician was selected to do the job. The florescent lighting fixtures in the main building in the main hall, entry hall, rest rooms and chambers have now been replaced with LED fixtures which significantly increased the lighting level in those areas. Unfortunately, material delays have delayed the installation in the Yard Sale building. The good news is that the LED Retrofit kits required to update the lights in that building have now arrived and our electrician has it on his schedule for the week following the Yard Sale in early June. This scheduling actually works better for Yard Sale Operations as the inventory has grown, the areas are very cluttered, and the job would be more difficult working around the inventory. The installation in June will give the crew something to look forward to when they return from their 2-week sabbatical after the sale.



**Main Building Roofing Repair Project** – Although this project has taken longer than expected, it appears that we have now identified the cause of the leak and are working toward the solution. As it turns out, an apparent overflow of the water in the gutter on the outside of our lounge seems to be the culprit. To validate our suspicions, our roofing contractor removed a section of gutter to which we tracked the point of origin. This section was removed in late January and aside from some condensation on the underside of the roof where the insulation was removed, there have been no leaks in the past 3 months. Pretty good evidence given the number of significant storms that we have had during that time.

To ensure that the water from the roof can drain properly, the underground lines that run to the trench along our side road have now been cleared and the storm water trench is being restored to its proper depth by the city.

Next step will be working with our roofing contractor to seal the gaps along this roof line, reinstall the gutter, reinstall the insulation below the roof, and drill overflow relief ports on the exterior of the gutters.

This should ensure that we do not have a recurrence and a need to put the trash can above the ceiling in the lounge once again!

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### CATHOLICS: WAVE THE STARS AND STRIPES THIS FLAG DAY

Catholics don't need to worry about celebrating the symbol of America on Flag Day, June 14 or on Independence Day, July 4. Patriotism is a good thing, especially in America. A mini-debate raged on the Internet a few years ago regarding American flags in Catholic churches. "American flags don't belong in church sanctuaries," read the headline in the National Catholic Reporter , explaining "America can do no wrong ' patriotism is not consistent with the Gospel. " That 's true. The article that followed suggested that the main problem with flags in church was America's recent wars.

The Catholic News Agency weighed in on the subject earlier, and came to a similar conclusion as the National Catholic Reporter, but for different reasons:

***"There was a time when we could proudly and clearly pledge our allegiance to that flag which represented 'one nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all. ' That statement is no longer true since the fateful Supreme Court decision legalizing abortion. Now it is 'with liberty and justice for some. ' Once we re- store the full and original meaning to that flag by assuring 'justice for all,' we can proudly present those col- ors in all the sanctuaries across the land. "***

In fact, though, there probably never was a time when the flag perfectly represented "one nation, under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all. " It certainly didn't for pre-civil rights era blacks. The U.S. bishops weighed in on the debate. While recommending against flags in the church sanctuary itself, the bishops said, "Surprisingly to many, there are no regulations of any kind governing the display of flags in Roman Catholic Churches. Neither the Code of Canon law, nor the liturgical books of the Roman rite com- ment on this practice."

And despite shortcomings, we have another reason to celebrate in America. "One must pay tribute to those nations whose systems permit the largest possible number of the citizens to take part in public life in a cli- mate of genuine freedom," says the Catechism. Isn't that a description of America? Favorite church hymns express the right kind of patriotism, "Faith of Our Fathers " was written to celebrate the British martyrs who died at the hand of their own government, but it is as stirringly patriotic as St. Thom- as More, who was "The King's good servant, but God 's first."

"God of Our Fathers" is an American hymn with an oblique reference to the flag ("the starry band ") that the U.S. bishops have used during the fortnight for Freedom. Last, the hymn "Immaculate Mary" prays "Bless, dearest Lady, the land of our birth." Think of that prayer when you see an American flag. Both mean the same thing.

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## Sir Knight of the Month – May

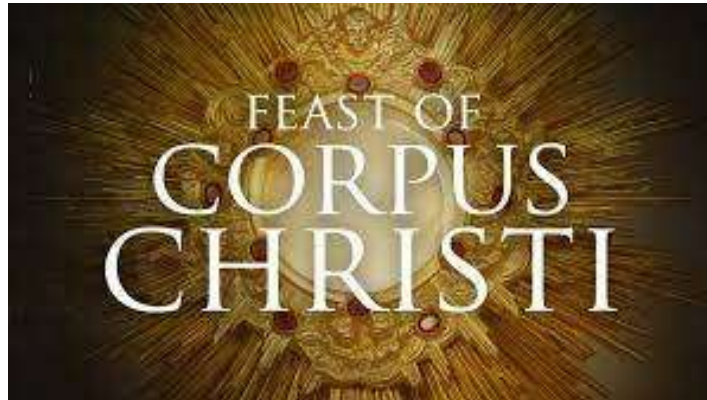
**This month's selection for SK of Month is Denny Colbert**

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1) Corpus Christi is a Holy Day of Obligation - but not in the United States. The Feast of Corpus Christi is one of the ten recognized Holy Days of Obligation in the Catholic Church, and is celebrated on the Thursday following Trinity Sunday. However, in several countries, Corpus Christi is celebrated on the following Sunday. Attendance at daily Mass on that Thursday is always encouraged, but is not mandatory in the United States.

2) Corpus Christi wasn't an official feast day for more than 60 years after its conception. While the Feast of Corpus Christi was first celebrated in 1246 in the Diocese of Liege, it wasn't until the 1300s that the celebration became widespread in the Church, after the Council of Vienne in 1311.

3) The procession most commonly associated with Corpus Christi wasn't originally part of the plan. Both Pope Urban IV and Pope Clement V published decrees regarding the celebration of the feast, in 1264 and 1311, but neither mentioned a public procession for the adoration of the Eucharist.

4) Corpus Christi followed a long and winding road to becoming a feast day. St. Juliana of Mont Cornillon in Belgium was the originator of the idea, and brought it to Bishop Robert de Thorete of Liege. From there, it made its way to Pope Urban IV, who had been an arch-deacon in her diocese, —but both Bishop Robert and Pope Urban died before the feast became universally celebrated. Pope Urban had declared the feast a universal feast of the Church but it wasn't until almost 80 years later, in 1325, that Corpus Christi was celebrated in England.

5) The Feast of Corpus Christi came about because as a result of a vision. St. Juliana of Mont Cornillon had a deep adoration of the Eucharist, and always wanted to see a special feast in its honor. This became a springboard when she experienced a vision of the Church under a full moon, with one dark spot on its surface. This darkness was symbolic of the absence of such a solemnity.

Locally, we will hold our Corpus Christi procession on Friday, June 9 at Old St. Paul. We will begin with 8 AM Mass and immediately following Mass we will process to the traffic circle at Broad Street and E. Front Street, where Fr. Tully will offer a blessing on the City of New Bern. WE will then return to the Catholic Charities Building (next to Old St. Paul) for a breakfast reception hosted by the Knights of Columbus.

Men are needed to assist in the procession with assisting in carrying the canopy which will cover the Bless Sacrament on the way to the traffic circle. ### **8 Things Every Catholic Dad Should Know About Fatherhood**

1. Encounter with God the Father: One can't give what he doesn't have. Many of us have been blessed with great fathers growing up but others haven't. In both cases, however, the source of Fatherhood must always come from above. Any man who seeks to be a good father, ignoring God the Father, will inevitably fall short. One must be aware that you aren't in control of your family, God is. Your leadership and service must be fruit of the obedience and humility that you live towards Him.
2. Conversion: A good father must be a converted man, or better yet, a man growing daily in conversion. Any man that abandons his efforts to live a Christian life, who doesn't allow the encounter with God the Father to transform him, abandons simultaneously the most fundamental testimony that he can give to his children. The encounter mentioned in the first point must be an effective one, you must grow, change, mature daily.
3. Be a man of Prayer: Conversion breaths prayer. Without it, it suffocates. If your schedule is too busy to allow time for prayer, change it.
4. Understand your True Vocation: For those that are blessed to be married and have children, you must recognize that helping your families get to heaven and being good husbands and fathers – not your business career – is your real vocation. Ask yourself: "Is my work serving my family? Or is my family serving my work?"
5. Presence not presents: Fatherhood means presence. Presence is "being with", "being for". This implies that you invest serious time with your family. And when I say serious time, I am referring to both quantity and quality. Have the courage to set the smartphone down and look your children in the eyes. Take a moment to marvel at who they are and who they are becoming. Look them in the eye, listen to them, speak to them about the things that matter. Share with them how you are doing, what's going on in your mind, in your heart, in your life. Share your "being" with them, not only what you have. Showering them with presents and fancy gifts is a poor substitute for face-to-face time; in fact, it isn't a substitute at all.
6. Have Courage: Have the courage to love according to the truth. The truth is that life isn't easy and neither is being a good Catholic. This means that you can't be a blend-in kind of father. Have the courage to correct, to teach, to demand, to challenge. And then have the courage to allow them to do the same to you.
7. Love your wife: Men, you must love and cherish your wives, plain and simple. Your children will learn to love others by how they see you and your wife love each other. The husband-wife relationship is their first school in love. It is the first lesson in community, in communication, in sacrifice, and in service. To love your wife means to offer your life for her, every day. "Husbands, love your wives, as Christ also loved the church, and delivered himself up for it."
8. Be humble: In any relationship of service and authority, one quickly becomes aware of his or her own weaknesses. Don't be afraid, accept it with humility; it is perhaps one of the greatest displays of authority that exists.
