February 2024 Family of the Month: Sir Knight Doug Uhland and his wife Nancy

Doug grew up in northern California where he attended UC Davis, earning a B.S. in physical sciences. He joined the Air Force after college attending Officer Training School, Pilot Training and advanced pilot training. Afterward, Doug was stationed at McGuire AFB, NJ where he flew the C-141 Starlifter.

Nancy grew up in northeastern Pennsylvania and graduated with a B.S. in elementary education from Penn State University. She was the first ever female Army R.O.T.C. cadet at Penn State. After graduation and officer training, she was stationed at Ft. Dix, NJ where she served as an assistant adjutant in a training brigade. As providence would have it, McGuire and Ft. Our Winter Yard Sale has now come and gone!



Well, that is two Yard Sales down and one more to go for our 2023 – 2024 fiscal year.

Luckily, the weather held out and we had large numbers of volunteers from New River and Cherry Point on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday. Didn't know we had them until about a week before the sale, but sure glad that they came thru for us!! A big thank you to the drivers that transported the volunteers back and forth to New River on the three days, Brian Tolbert, Craig Baader, Doug Uhland, and Randall Ramian put a combined 1,600 miles on their vehicles during the week between them. Thanks to Mike Lynch for coordinating and transporting the volunteers from Cherry Point on Saturday.

We weren't sure exactly how well we would do on this one as the storage areas still had some space and the number of sofas, love seats, and fabric chairs were somewhat limited. Craig and I had our normal conversation about a week before and we made our normal guesses at what our total sales would be for the event. He guessed \$35k and I guessed \$36k, but we both agreed that we would probably do \$40k since we always underestimate. We predictably missed our numbers once again and came in at \$39,675!! Happily, we were wrong one more time!!

Everything ran pretty smoothly during the event, and aside from the rush at the beginning of the sale on Thursday, the crowd level was pretty normal during the three days.

Once again, the proceeds of the sale help the Assembly/Council to fund more than \$50,000 in donations each year to a group of local and national charities, which include: St Paul's CC & School, RCS, Boys & Girls Clubs & Homes, Promise Place, FF Harbour Hospital Auxiliary, Craven County Partners in Education, Fund for Needy Children, New Bern Senior Center, MS, YMCA, Red Cross, St Jude's and a number of veterans charities.

I would also like to remind everyone once again that we are still in need of additional helpers to assist with pickups and the processing of donations each week. The primary group works from 9 til 12 on Monday and Tuesdays and is critical to our success. With 15 new members recently admitted to the Assembly, we are hoping that we get some new helpers.

Next sale is scheduled for June 6th – 8th!

Yard Sale Storage Containers finding a new home at end of Yard Sale

Well, the storage containers will be removed from our property within the next few days by the contractor that purchased them several months ago. So, we have now completed Step 1) Clearing of the trees and brush from the affected area, Step 2) Removal of the storage containers to allow for site preparation by our building contractor, and Step 3) Submittal of the site plan to the city review committee.

I attended their review hearing on Friday, Feb 16th and am now awaiting their documented comments to which we must respond. They have until Friday the 23rd to provide them. A question was raised by the Fire Marshall's office during the hearing about our proximity to the nearest fire hydrant, as we are hundreds of feet out of compliance with the current code. At this juncture, we are trying to identify a contractor to do the work before the building is completed and whether we or the city are responsible for the installation. Alderman Bobby Aster (form New Bern Fire Chief) is looking into this for us



Given the duration of the review cycles, we will have to postpone the start of construction until either March 18th or 25th. We should know within a week.

Once final approval is obtained, the site prep work begins, which involves the addition of 80 tons of sand/fill and the grading of the parcel to facilitate the new building. After this is completed, the pad for



the new building and the ramp will be poured. This will require about 2 weeks to cure (weather dependent) before the building can be erected.

The actual erection of the building should start on or by early April and should only take a few days. We will then bring in the electrician to wire the building, connecting it to circuits within our existing YS Building.

The last task will be the installation of protective panels on the inside of the building to prevent damage to the outer skin. This will be completed by our volunteers (probably our truck monkeys) as soon as our electrician is finished.

My best guess at completion date is now on or about April 5th (how's that for a commitment).

So, at that point we will be open for business and ready to store the furniture and such donated by the New Bern communities!!

The Story of St. Patrick



St. Patrick of Ireland is one of the world's most popular saints. He was born in Roman Britain and when he was fourteen or so, he was captured by Irish pirates during a raiding party and taken to Ireland as a slave to herd and tend sheep. At the time, Ireland was a land of Druids and pagans but Patrick turned to God and wrote his memoir, *The Confession*. In *The Confession*, he wrote:

"The love of God and his fear grew in me more and more, as did the faith, and my soul was rosed, so that, in a single day, I have said as many as a hundred prayers and in the night, nearly the same. I prayed in the woods and on the mountain, even before dawn. I felt no hurt from the snow or ice or rain."

Patrick's captivity lasted until he was twenty, when he escaped after having a dream from God in which he was told to leave Ireland by going to the coast. There he found some sailors who took him back to Britain and was reunited with his family. A few years after returning home, Patrick saw a vision he described in his memoir:

"I saw a man coming, as it were from Ireland. His name was Victoricus, and he carried many letters, and he gave me one of them. I read the heading: 'The Voice of the Irish.' As I began the letter, I imagined in that moment that I heard the voice of those very people who were near the wood of Foclut, which is beside the western sea-and they cried out, as with one voice: 'We appeal to you, holy servant boy, to come and walk among us.'"

The vision prompted his studies for the priesthood. He was ordained by St. Germanus, the Bishop of Auxerre, whom he had studied under for years, and was later ordained a bishop and sent to take the Gospel to Ireland.

Patrick arrived in Slane, Ireland on March 25, 433. There are several legends about what happened next, with the most prominent claiming he met the chieftain of one of the druid tribes, who tried to kill him. After an intervention from God, Patrick was able to convert the chieftain and preach the Gospel throughout Ireland. There, he converted many people - eventually thousands - and he began building churches across the country.

He often used shamrocks to explain the Holy Trinity and entire kingdoms were eventually converted to Christianity after hearing Patrick's message.

Patrick preached and converted all of Ireland for 40 years. He worked many miracles and wrote of his love for God in *Confessions*. After years of living in poverty, traveling and enduring much suffering he died March 17, 461.

He died at Saul, where he had built the first Irish church. He is believed to be buried in Down Cathedral, Downpatrick. His grave was marked in 1990 with a granite stone.

"Christ beside me, Christ before me, Christ behind me, Christ within me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me."

Easter Triduum



On March 24, Palm Sunday, the Christian community enters into the final week of preparation for Easter Sunday, a week often called Holy Week, members of the Catholic community will begin to start talking about something called Triduum. The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the Lenten season, and leads to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil.

The liturgical services that take place during the Triduum are: Mass of the Lord's Supper, Good Friday of the Lord's Passion, and the Easter Vigil. Taken from a Latin root that means "three days", it is a period of time that traces the final days of Jesus' life, his death, and his resurrection from the dead.

Starting on the Thursday before Easter Sunday, each day is traditionally marked with a particular liturgy. On Holy Thursday there is the Mass of the Lord's Supper that marks the Last Supper that Jesus had with his disciples, wherein he showed them what it means to serve by washing their feet. It is also meant to mark what is seen as the establishment of the celebration of the Eucharist (or Mass).

Good Friday is marked with fasting and prayer as a way to remember Jesus' suffering and death on the cross. The Good Friday liturgy involves the reading of Jesus' passion and death from the Gospel of John as well as an opportunity to pray with and venerate a cross – the instrument of Jesus' death and our salvation.

Holy Saturday is meant to be a quiet day, remembering the empty space that was present for the disciples of Jesus after his death and before his resurrection. They did not expect the resurrection and so were left in a place of grief.

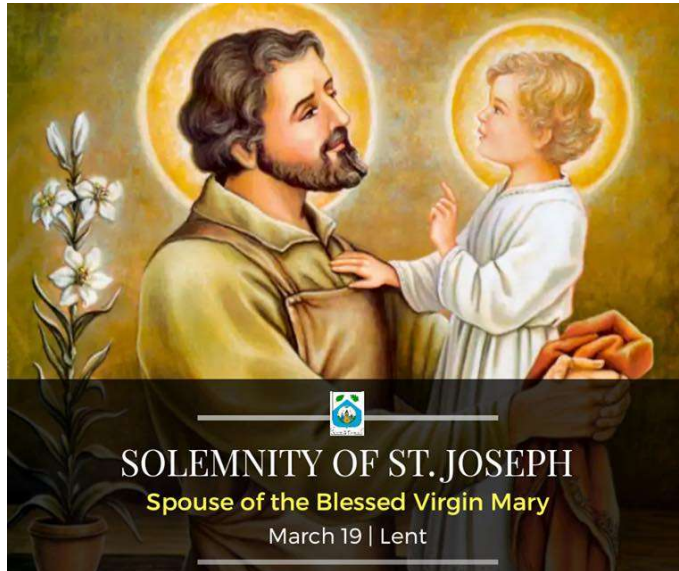
After sundown on Holy Saturday, the Easter Vigil is celebrated. It one of the longest of Catholic liturgies, involving several readings from scripture tracing God's care for humanity, the baptism and reception of new members of the Church, the celebration of the Eucharist, and a great many joy-filled songs. It was that night when Jesus rose from the dead. It is that great victory over sin and death that the community celebrates.

Our community will then gather again on Easter Sunday to celebrate Mass and continue to the joyous songs of celebration. Jesus Christ has risen to die no more! Humanity has been invited into that same trajectory through death to life.

If you want to fully participate in the beginning of the upcoming easter Season, I encourage you to participate in the Triduum this year. The Paschal Mystery celebrated in these days is the whole plan of God's redemption for the world through the passion, death, and resurrection of his Son, Jesus Christ.

Solemnity of St. Joseph



Some of you may remember seeing the classic romantic comedy film from the early fifties, "The Quiet Man" starring screen legends John Wayne, Maureen O'Hara and Barry Fitzgerald. Some of you may not remember either the film or the actors but it took place in Ireland, where John Wayne had returned after a boxing career in the US to find some peace and quiet, hence the film's title "The Quiet Man." Ironically, he fell in love and found just the opposite.

Tuesday, March 19, is the solemn feast of St. Joseph, the Spouse of Mary. If a film would be made of his life today, I think it might also be called "The Quiet Man" but with a different storyline than that portrayed by John Wayne.

St. Joseph was truly "the quiet man" in the history of human salvation. Holy Scripture does not have much to say about him nor does it contain much of a record about anything he said. And, yet, his quiet and unassuming role in the lives of the Blessed Virgin Mary and her Divine Son Jesus have earned him an unforgettable and amazing place in our Christian faith: saints, theologians, religious scholars have written volumes about him of the history of the Catholic Church. 150 years ago, Blessed Pope Pius IX declared this "quiet man," Patron of the Universal Church. In Pope Francis recognized the anniversary in 2021 by proclaiming, "The Year of St. Joseph."

Today, I'd like to single out three things we celebrate about St. Joseph.

First, he was --- as today's feast solemnly commemorates --- "husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary." If it were not for that fact, if it were not for her, the world would never have heard of this "quiet man." He loved a young Jewish maiden who said "yes" to God in complete trust and confidence and he joined her in that "yes." St. Joseph and the world would never be the same. For the Christian, Joseph as "husband of Mary" is the model of openness to God's will.

Second, Joseph was the "foster-father of the Lord Jesus." The great teacher and doctor of the Church St. Thomas Aquinas wrote that in the incarnation and birth of Jesus Christ, he needed the care and protection of a father. Pope Francis describes the fatherhood of Joseph in several ways: "A beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father, a creatively courageous father, a working father, a father in the shadows." A quiet man of whom Pope Benedict XVI encouraged, "Let us allow ourselves to be 'infected' by the 'silence of St. Joseph.' We have much need of it in a world which is often too noisy, which does not encourage reflection and listening to the voice of God. For the Christian, Joseph as "foster-father of the Lord Jesus" is the father, guardian and protector of the Church, the "Body of Christ throughout time." He is our "foster-father."

Third, and finally, Joseph was a "working man who found God's presence in human labor." Joseph was a humble man who did not seek recognition or privilege in the conduct of his daily life. The callouses on his hands bore great witness to the dignity of everyday ordinary life. For the Christian, Joseph as a quiet "working man" showed what it meant to "practice the presence of God." He is a "model of quiet prayer and closeness to Jesus, whose example invites us to think about the time we devote to prayer each day."

"Each of us," Pope Francis has said, "can discover in Joseph - the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence - an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble. Saint Joseph reminds us that those who appear hidden or in the shadows can play an incomparable role in the history of salvation."

So, on this Feast of St. Joseph, let us beg God for the grace to imitate this fatherly role model - "the quiet man" in the daily unfolding of our own personal salvation.
