Recently, at our Winter Yard Sale, Lamb raised \$327, assisted by Vince. This marks a promising start to the year. To celebrate, a dinner was organized for Thursday, February 27, with a social hour at 6 pm, followed by dinner at 6:30 pm. Guests enjoyed a cash bar, and the event finished with check distributions. ### **February 2025 Family of the Month: Sir Knight Ron and Denise Biggs**

Born in 1953, Ron hails from Miami, Florida, while Denise is from Rhinebeck, New York. After high school, Ron joined the Marine Corps in 1972. He served overseas in Okinawa, Japan, was a drill instructor at Parris Island, SC, and was assigned embassy duty as Detachment Commander in Bangladesh, Nicaragua, and San Salvador.

Ron assumed the post of Detachment Commander in El Salvador during a time when four Marines were killed. Ron and Denise met in Managua, Nicaragua, where Denise taught at an American school. They married in Panama City, Panama, in 1986. Denise earned her Master of Education degree, and Ron earned his Bachelor of Business degree from Park College.

Ron also served as a Drill Instructor at Officer Candidate School in Quantico, VA, and as the first Sergeant of Alpha Company (Northern Europe) in Frankfurt, Germany. If these achievements weren't impressive enough, Ron also served as Sergeant Major with the 5th Battalion, 10th Marines Artillery, the 1st Battalion, 6th Infantry, the Marine Security Guard School, and the Battalion in Quantico, VA. Ron retired from the Marines in 2002 after 30 years of distinguished, honorable service.

Following his Marine Corps career, Ron worked for the Department of State, Physical Security Division, then as a contractor on an Army Satellite Communications Program as the Customer Support Manager. Denise was a semi stay-at-home mom while working as a teacher's aide, providing stability for the family during Ron's deployments.

As we begin to prepare for this season of Lent—a season of repentance and reflection—let us contemplate what this time means and how the three pillars of Lent lead us to a closer relationship with God.

The word Lent comes from an old English word meaning “spring,” or “a new birth.” This time of year helps us to renew our lives as Catholics and renew our life in Jesus, his Church, and his Father. These 40 days allow us to journey with Jesus through his passion and death leading us to rejoice in his resurrection. This is the reality of the Paschal Mystery, the essence of our sacramental life in the Church.

The Church offers three extraordinary ways to draw closer to this mystery in order to fully immerse us in the Lenten experience: Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving.

**Prayer:** Prayer is conversation with God. It is essential for fasting and almsgiving because prayer gives us the strength to fast. Pope Francis said, “Lent is a privileged time for prayer.” In prayer, we draw closer in relationship with God. Relationship with God makes us grateful for the blessings we have received. Prayer is the cornerstone of our Lenten journey and is vital to all of our actions in life.

*Scripture References for Prayer: Zephaniah 3: 17; Joel 2: 1-2  
16: 33; Philippians 3: 10-11*

**Fasting & Abstinence:** Fasting and abstinence are old traditions in Judeo-Christian history and early Lenten practice. Found in the Scriptures, they offer a way of growing closer to God. Pope Francis reminds us, “Fasting makes sense if it really chips away at our security and, as a consequence, benefits someone else...”

The current regulations are as follows:

Individuals between the ages of 18 and 59 are required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by having only one full meal and two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal.

All over the age of 14 are required to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays during Lent.

In addition to the above traditional forms, try fasting from social media, technology, gossip, and excessive screen time. Fasting reminds us of our hunger for God.

*Scripture References for Fasting: Joel 2: 12-14; Isaiah 58: 6-7  
Matthew 6: 16-18; Mark 1: 12-15*

**Almsgiving:** Almsgiving (giving) is a response to God, one that we can come to through prayer and fasting. It is a way to live out our gratitude for all that God has given us, reflecting the realization that we are the Body of Christ, responsible for each other. Justice, mercy, and charity are integral elements of our baptism that call us to be disciples of Jesus.

*Scripture References for Almsgiving: Leviticus 19: 9-10; Proverbs 19: 17 ; Luke 19: 1-10; Romans 15: 25-28*

## Ash Wednesday Q&A (Deacon Jim)

On Ash Wednesday, you may encounter Christians, especially Catholics, wearing a smudge of ashes on their foreheads. That could be a bit startling unless you know the meaning behind this religious practice.

Here is what you should know about Ash Wednesday and the celebration of Lent.

**When is Ash Wednesday this year?** Wednesday, March 5

### **Can Catholics eat meat on Ash Wednesday?**

No. Catholics are not supposed to eat meat on Ash Wednesday. They also are expected to give up meat on Fridays during Lent.

### **Do you fast on Ash Wednesday?**

Catholics also are expected to fast on Ash Wednesday. Fasting means consuming only one full meal a day; two smaller meals that don't together add up to a full meal also are allowed. Children and the elderly are exempt from the fasting requirement on Ash Wednesday and during Lent.

### **Why ashes on Ash Wednesday?**

Ash Wednesday - officially known as the Day of Ashes - is a day of repentance, when Christians confess their sins and profess their devotion to God. During a Mass (or an Ash Service) a priest, deacon or Liturgical Minister places the ashes on a worshiper's forehead in the shape of a cross. The ceremony is meant to show that a person belongs to Jesus Christ, and it also represents a person's grief and mourning for their sins – the same sins that Christians believe Jesus Christ gave his life for when he died on the cross.

Ash Wednesday is important because it marks the start of the Lenten period leading up to Easter, when Christians believe Jesus was resurrected. The ashes symbolize both death and repentance. During this period, Christians show repentance and mourning for their sins, because they believe Christ died for them.

When the minister applies the cross of ashes, he says to the worshiper: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." He also may say "Repent and believe in the Gospel."

It is not required that a worshiper wear the ashes for the rest of the day, although many Christians choose to do so. However, dining out or doing non-essential shopping are considered inappropriate on Ash Wednesday.

### **Where do the ashes come from?**

Traditionally, ashes used on Ash Wednesday are gathered up after palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday are burned. They are then blessed before being used in the ceremony.

Palms are used on Palm Sunday in many Christian churches to symbolize Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem on the Sunday before his crucifixion. Residents of Jerusalem are said to have waved palm fronds to celebrate his arrival.

### **Is Ash Wednesday based on a pagan festival?**

No. Early Christians in Rome were sprinkled with ashes during Lent, but the Ash Wednesday practice of placing ashes on the forehead of Christians didn't begin until the Middle Ages.
